**Purpose:** Research Grants in the Arts support research studies that investigate the value and/or impact of the arts, either as individual components of the U.S. arts ecology or as they interact with each other and/or with other domains of American life.

State and Tribal governments will purchase food from local and regional farmers/producers, targeting socially disadvantaged farmers/producers. These cooperative agreements will allow for entities to procure local, domestic foods that are unique to their geographic area and meet the needs of the populations. In addition to increasing local food consumption, funds are expected to help build and expand economic opportunity for local and socially disadvantaged farmers/producers.

**Eligible Applicants:** Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized) and State governments. AMS will make only one award per State or territory; agencies within the State must coordinate if more than one agency wishes to implement this program. Awards to Tribal Governments are not considered a state agency award; additional awards will be made to Tribal Governments.

**CRIMINAL JUSTICE**

- [U.S. Department of Justice Coordinated Tribal Assistance Solicitation Fiscal year 2022 Competitive Grant Announcement](#)

**Purpose:** CTAS combines many of the Department of Justice's (DOJ's) existing tribal government-specific competitive solicitations into a single solicitation requiring only one application from each tribe or tribal consortium. This approach reduces the number of applications required to access funds and provides federally recognized tribes, tribal consortia, and tribal designees the opportunity to develop a comprehensive approach to public safety and victimization issues. Note: CTAS is not a program but a single solicitation under which tribes can apply to seven separate grant programs from four grant-making offices.

**Eligible Applicants:** Federally recognized Indian tribes. (1) Consortia consisting of two or more federally recognized Indian tribes. Tribal designees are eligible applicants only for certain activities related to the Office for Victims of Crime (OVC) programs.

## ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

**Purpose:** Through this funding opportunity, the Economic Development Administration has modified the Economic Adjustment Assistance program to better help communities respond to and prepare for economic disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. Examples of eligible projects include economic recovery and resiliency planning, implementing entrepreneurial support programs, and completing public works projects that will support economic recovery (e.g. broadband deployment to support telehealth and remote learning). EDA expects to fund between 80 and 100 percent of eligible project costs.
